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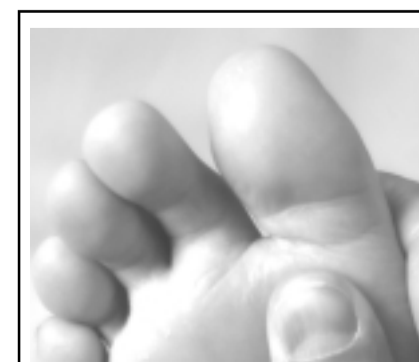
Seneca School students are preparing for the annual formal Christmas Tea to be held in the gym Dec. 16. The junior high students helped the K-4 class make invitations.
